#### UK-Wide Coastal Arts Festival 1 May - 1 June 2025

We invite participants – organisations, artists, walkers, writers, activists, and scientists – to join a month-long journey in 2025 to explore, celebrate, and engage with the UK's coastlines. We encourage you to participate by organising walking and arts-based activities that reflect on and respond to your coastal environment and the climate emergency.

As part of the Beach of Dreams network, you are invited to contribute to Kinetika's evolving national artwork – an installation of hundreds of naturally dyed silk pennants, each representing an individual's dream connected to a unique part of the coastline. This collaborative project, started in 2021, tells the collective story of our relationship with the coast.

This Resource Pack will guide you in designing your own pennant, sharing your story and making a Climate Commitment for meaningful action. So far, 620 silks have been created through pilot projects in Suffolk and Essex (2021) and Morecambe Bay (2023).

#### Designing your silk



If you are a Beach of Dreams Member or have signed up to contribute to the national artwork – The Beach of Dreams Silks by Kinetika – you'll play a part in adding to the dynamic, evolving and travelling installation of hundreds of naturally-dyed, hand-painted silks. To date, over 600+ pennants have been created, showcasing the profound connections people have with their coastal environments.

Your questions, Climate Commitment, drawings, and photographs will inspire the creation of your bespoke silk pennant at Kinetika Studios by Kinetika artists. These pennants celebrate your connection to the coast and can be carried, performed with, or displayed during outdoor activities during the 2025 festival.

#### Begin with a question

Beach of Dreams invites you to respond to the question: How can we create a better future for our coastlines, our environment, our wildlife, and ourselves? Questions are at the heart of the Beach of Dreams programme, with each commission centred around a particular thought-provoking question and its response, sparking reflection and creativity. We encourage you to embrace this spirit of inquiry as you embark on creating your pennant.

What kind of future do you envision? Perhaps resilient shores brimming with wildlife, communities coming together to combat climate change, or a coastline shaped by personal memories. Your questions and ideas will serve as a powerful catalyst for your pennant creation.

- What if the tides could tell stories of change?
- How can we balance our love of the sea with its preservation?
- What does your coastline need most to thrive?

Let your curiosity guide you.

#### Capture your coastline

Your photographs will serve as the foundation for your drawing, which Kinetika artists will transform into a unique design. To guide this process, we invite you to view the landscape as if it were a drawing. Look for the lines, shapes, and graphic elements that stand out -what is easy to interpret visually?

We ask you to take two high-resolution colour photographs of your beach or coastal location:

- Wide shot: A landscape view that gives context and captures the essence of where you are.
- Close-up: A detailed image of something that inspires you. This will help shape your bespoke silk pennant. Focus on elements such as patterns, textures, shapes, or colors that make your coastline unique.

Need inspiration? Look at the ground beneath your feet and the surrounding landscape and seascape. What catches your eye? Sea, sand, rocks, shells, plants, animals, piers, posts, graffiti, nets, or even the play of light and shadow.





#### Reflect and write

In 300 words or fewer, describe your connection to this stretch of coastline.

- Begin by revisiting your central question
- What drew you to this location? What do you see there that captures your attention?
- Reflect on who you share this stretch of coastline with.

  Are there cherished memories tied to this place?
- Consider how the coastline has changed over time. What transformations have you observed, and how have they impacted the environment, the community, or your connection to this place?
- Your dreams and concerns for the future of this coastline, what do you hope for its preservation, growth, or resilience in the face of challenges?

Give your piece a meaningful title, to encapsulate its essence. Let your words capture the beauty, history, and aspirations that link you to this unique stretch of coast.

#### Shells at Shoeburyness

I had wanted to walk to the end of the bar at Shoeburyness ever since I'd set foot on East Beach about three years ago. We'd checked the tide on this chilly Movember morning and followed rivulets of receding water as it lured us as far as we dare go. Surprisingly the sun emerged and pierced through the limpet covered concrete pillars reflecting on the wet shiny cracked mud, revealing clusters of cockle shells, embedded in soggy sand, washed up on top of each other, cracked, broken, fragmented.

Since working in Thurrock, I've walked many times, the miles that stretch and wind down river from Purfleet-on-Thames to this point at the mouth of the estuary, where the Thames meets the North Sea. I've met and

## Turn your reflection into a Climate Commitment

This step is optional (the Kinetika artists will create a drawing from your photographs if you prefer), but we highly encourage you to give it a try. Your drawing can be any size.

- 1. Download our pennant template
  Pennants are 180cm x 50cm
- Print out your close-up photo and use a pencil to trace its lines, patterns, and textures.
- 3. Refine your design within the template, simplifying or exaggerating these patterns with a thick marker.
- 4. Scan or photograph your completed drawing for submission.

- Your question
- 2 high-res colour photographs (wide shot and close-up)
- 300 words describing your connection to the coast
- Your optional black-and-white line drawing
- Your Climate Commitment

Think about the role your actions can play in protecting your coastline and the wider environment. Use your observations and written reflections to shape a meaningful Climate Commitment. What do you value most about our shorelines? How have you seen them change over time, and what do you hope for their future? For example:

- "I will advocate for the protection of coastal habitats, working to safeguard wildlife and biodiversity in the face of climate change."
- "I will actively campaign for policies that promote sustainable practices, ensuring the preservation of this coastline for future generations."
- "I pledge to organise monthly beach cleanups, helping to reduce plastic pollution and protect marine ecosystems."

Share this commitment pledge alongside your submission to show how your personal connection can inspire real-world action. Whether big or small, every step counts. wW


#### Inspiration










#### Why 'Beach of Dreams'?

In 2017, Kinetika's Silk River project connected ten communities along the Thames in the UK and the Hooghly River in India through a creative exploration of their environments. These connections were forged through long-distance walks with local residents, accompanied by stunning silk banners that told the unique stories of each location.

Kevin Rushby, a traveler, author, and journalist, joined these walks and documented his journey in a daily blog. On one memorable day, he walked with Kinetika's Art Director Ali Pretty from Tilbury to East Tilbury. Along the Thames Estuary's glittering foreshore, he was struck by the remnants of history scattered across the landscape, which led him to name it "The Beach of Broken Dreams." His reflections reveal how the river still holds echoes of World War II, a poignant reminder of lives disrupted and dreams shattered.

Silk River, 2017



A few years ago, near Tilbury, I experienced something profound. In the bleakest setting, on a grey flat day, with a muddy tide sucking on a scraggy shoreline, I came across a beach filled with marvels and treasure. It was the place where London had dumped its Blitz debris on top of a Victorian tip which was itself on top of a Georgian dump, and so on back to the Romans. I was totally unprepared for it. No one had warned me. I'd strayed from the path and was watching my feet when I began to zigzag between the strange objects that were sticking out from the shingle and sand.

Gently extracting a complete 19th century glass bottle from under a broken WWII wireless set and a vicious thistle, I reflected that you just never know where joy and salvation are coming from. Beauty and hope can crop up in the unlikeliest of places.

The beach is always the place where human life is exposed, with all its frailties, ambitions and dreams. Voyages begin and end here. Clothes are removed to expose the hard-won six-pack, or the beer belly. Novels are started and finally finished. Children and dogs have fun, but sometimes, tragically, drown. On beaches we find sublime


panoramas, but also all the rubbish that we had thrown away and hoped never to see again. With a brutal disregard for human sensitivities, the sands bear witness to our mistakes: the dead dolphin in a broken fishing net, the empty container with the skull and crossbones sticker, and the stricken seabirds marinaded in crude oil - all things I have encountered on the British coast. And somewhere high up in the dunes among the rare orchids and butterflies, there is often a wavy line of dried seaweed, like a hastily scribbled message from the sea, warning us of even higher tides to come.
