While we have always maintained a strong practice of giving at the heart of our work, 2025 marked our first year of formalised partnerships across our value chain in India and in the UK with the goal of taking **an intentional and active approach to giving**.

Our giving was, and continues to be, guided by our commitment to making an enduring, positive impact on the communities we work with across our value chain, and those beyond our direct reach. As we do in our business, we define our giving using the 3 Ps of product, people and planet. This year, we specially adapted them to meet local needs and priorities as follows:

product: preserving heritage crafts and designing for a future resilient planet

people: creating opportunities for underserved communities to thrive with independence

planet: conserving nature by reducing waste in all the communities we serve

Guided by these principles, we have had the opportunity to partner with some truly innovative, community-driven and transformative organisations. It has been a pleasure to learn from each of our grantees, and I am excited to share their incredible work with you.

2025 has also been a milestone year for us as **re-wrap officially became a UK Community Interest Company (CIC)**. CICs operate to benefit the communities they serve, placing community wellbeing at the centre. At the heart of this structure is a commitment to giving, formally ratified by our new structure and governing documents. **This has always been my intention with re-wrap: to be a catalyst for positive impact on people and planet, and so becoming a CIC, in a sense, is like coming home.**

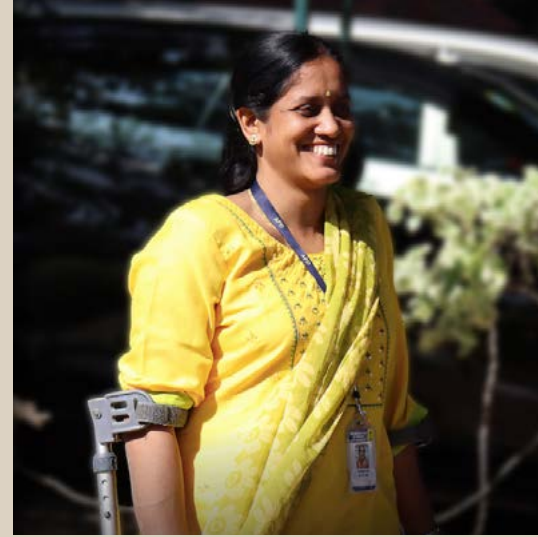

asan x re-wrap

about

Asan is a social enterprise making sustainable period care accessible to all women in India. They have developed an easy-to-use menstrual cup and operate on a 1-for-1 donation model: for every cup purchased, one is donated to a woman or girl in need. This enables them to address period poverty while building a sustainable social enterprise.

They provide comprehensive menstrual health education and information about the environmental impact of disposable products. Like re-wrap, Asan uses sustainable products to create opportunities for marginalised communities while protecting the planet.

impact

Asan’s intervention delivers holistic impact for people and planet. They have donated 96,578 menstrual cups to women and girls who cannot afford period products, directly addressing period poverty. Their work has averted 10,060 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions and prevented 4,078 tonnes of landfill waste by replacing disposable pads and tampons.

The organisation has contributed over 100,000 days of productive work gained, as women with reliable menstrual products can participate more fully in education and employment.

the association of people with disability (APD)



about

For over six decades, the Association of People with Disability (APD) has transformed what is possible for people with disabilities in India. Their 'Life Cycle Approach' recognises that support needs change across a person's lifetime and that empowerment requires acknowledging every individual's unique situation.

APD serves every type of disability, providing assistive devices, inclusive education, spinal cord injury rehabilitation, and community mental health services. We support APD's Community Mental Health Programme in Tumkur because mental health services remain critically underserved in India, particularly for people with disabilities.

impact

APD has achieved noteworthy scale and impact, serving over 1,000,000 individuals with disabilities through healthcare, education, employment, and advocacy interventions. Through their community mental health programme, APD has supported over 40,000 PwMIs from underserved communities. In education, APD has enabled over 46,700 children to receive quality education in inclusive settings. The organisation has distributed more than 69,000 assistive devices and mobility aids, improving the quality of life and independence of people with disabilities.

APD's policy and advocacy work influences national government programmes and schemes, expanding and strengthening existing initiatives for people with disabilities.

body & soul x re-wrap

This 2025 grant is designed to strengthen their flagship suicide prevention programme, which provides specialist support for young people at risk of suicide to stabilise and to flourish.

about

Body & Soul takes a holistic approach to suicide prevention, working from the ground up to heal mind, body, and soul within a therapeutic community that nurtures resilience and restores hope. They are committed to supporting those underserved by traditional systems, particularly people of colour who are disproportionately impacted by suicide.

They go beyond crisis intervention, addressing root causes of suicidal behavior through evidence-based, trauma-informed care that combines neuroscience, psychology, creativity, and community, all delivered with love and compassion. This holistic method transforms lives and enables lasting recovery.

impact

Body & Soul has pioneered a culturally sensitive approach to suicide prevention that delivers measurable results. Through their 'You Are Not Alone' programme, they have transformed the lives of over 900 young people aged 16-35 who have attempted suicide. Remarkably, no young person coming to Body & Soul has died by suicide since completing the programme.

Participants report significant reductions in self-harming behaviour, improved mental health, stronger connections with family and friends, and the ability to live fuller and happier lives.

fat macy's x re-wrap

Fat Macy's grant is designed to build their internal capacity with the goal of creating more opportunities for beneficiaries to earn and thrive independently.

about

Fat Macy's supports people moving from temporary accommodation into permanent housing through culinary and hospitality training, 1:1 support, and access to rental deposits. They address a critical gap in the UK's housing system: residents in temporary accommodation face a 16-hour weekly work cap, creating a cycle where they must choose between minimal work hours or risking rent default.

Through their work experience programme, trainees learn valuable skills alongside professional chefs and front-of-house teams. After training, they access housing deposit grants, career counseling, mental health support, and long-term mentorship.

impact

Since 2016, Fat Macy's has helped dozens of graduates move into private rented accommodation. They have provided over 1,600 hours of work experience and more than 1,000 hours of one-to-one support. Saving for an average housing deposit and first month's rent in London would take someone in a hostel five-and-a-half years under current conditions.

Fat Macy's programme offers a unique pathway, allowing residents to accrue 200 hours of work experience without impacting housing benefit. Trainees also receive individualised support from Progression Officers for coaching and confidence building.

food behind bars



about

Food Behind Bars improves food served in British prisons, working across England and Wales to enhance the lives of those eating and making prison food. They deliver practical food-based education, promote healthy eating, and design wholesome menus. Founded in response to a 2016 report concluding that poor quality prison food impacts violent behavior, mental health, and rehabilitation, they address a critical need. Increased nutrition amongst prisoners has been shown to reduce violent offenses by 37%. We partner with them because they believe that everyone deserves dignity and the opportunity to learn and thrive.

impact

Food Behind Bars has delivered projects across multiple UK prisons. At HMP Woodhill, their 8-month project led to a 150% rise in food satisfaction rates and staff reporting improved skills and job satisfaction after rolling out over 25 new recipes and reducing processed food on prison menus.

At HMP Bristol, they piloted their new Prison Food Education Programme, delivering kitchen training, developing new recipes and menus, and establishing Rise & Prove, an in-house bakery that teaches prisoners baking skills, while getting fresh, homemade items onto the menu.

hasiru dala x re-wrap

This 2025 grant provides financial and technical support for Hasiru Dala's Textile Recovery Facilities, where waste entrepreneurs aggregate and process hundreds of tonnes of textile waste each year.

about

Hasiru Dala, meaning "Green Force" in Kannada, champions waste pickers: a critical but largely invisible community. Waste pickers collect and recycle waste that would otherwise overwhelm landfills, yet face social stigma, economic insecurity, and lack of recognition.

Hasiru Dala's holistic approach transforms them from an invisible workforce into recognised professionals with identity cards, social security, healthcare, housing, and educational opportunities for their children. Their work exemplifies our three giving principles: building sustainable waste management infrastructure, creating respected livelihoods, and preserving traditional skills while innovating for the future.

impact

Hasiru Dala has achieved important impact for waste picker communities. They have provided social security benefits to 68,689 waste pickers across Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh, and issued occupational identity cards to over 10,000 waste pickers in Karnataka, giving them formal recognition and access to government benefits.

The Buguri Children's Programme has supported over 20,965 children of waste pickers, helping them stay in school and complete their education, breaking the intergenerational cycle of waste picking as the only livelihood option.

hopscotch women's centre



about

Hopscotch Women's Centre is a sanctuary for underserved women and their families, providing grassroots community services in times of need. They support women overcoming poverty, escaping abuse, tackling mental health issues, and transitioning into employment.

Their approach is culturally sensitive and trauma-informed, respecting the diverse cultural backgrounds of the women they serve. With 27 languages spoken at the Centre, they create an environment where women feel at ease seeking support. They address racial and gender inequality, empowering women to be included and equal in society.

impact

Hopscotch has significant reach and impact, serving thousands of women in their years of work. They provide holistic services including: violence against women and girls advocacy, housing and welfare advice, refugee support, skills and employment development, mental health and wellbeing services, and homecare for women across London.

Their approach is grounded in understanding trauma and its impact on vulnerable communities. Their person-centered model ensures each woman's journey is unique, with tailored support. Hopscotch has built expertise in accessing hard-to-reach populations and providing support for complex issues and barriers to care.

INTACH Bangalore is the local steward of Karnataka's rich cultural legacy and part of India's largest heritage conservation network. Their multifaceted approach documents heritage while actively advocating for its protection. They provide technical expertise on restoration projects and educate the public, particularly young people, making heritage conservation accessible and engaging.

As Bangalore grows and evolves, INTACH mediates between development pressures and preservation importance. Their research on the Hoysala dynasty connects to our creation units in Mysore, helping ensure future generations understand and value the craftsmanship that has defined Karnataka for centuries.

impact

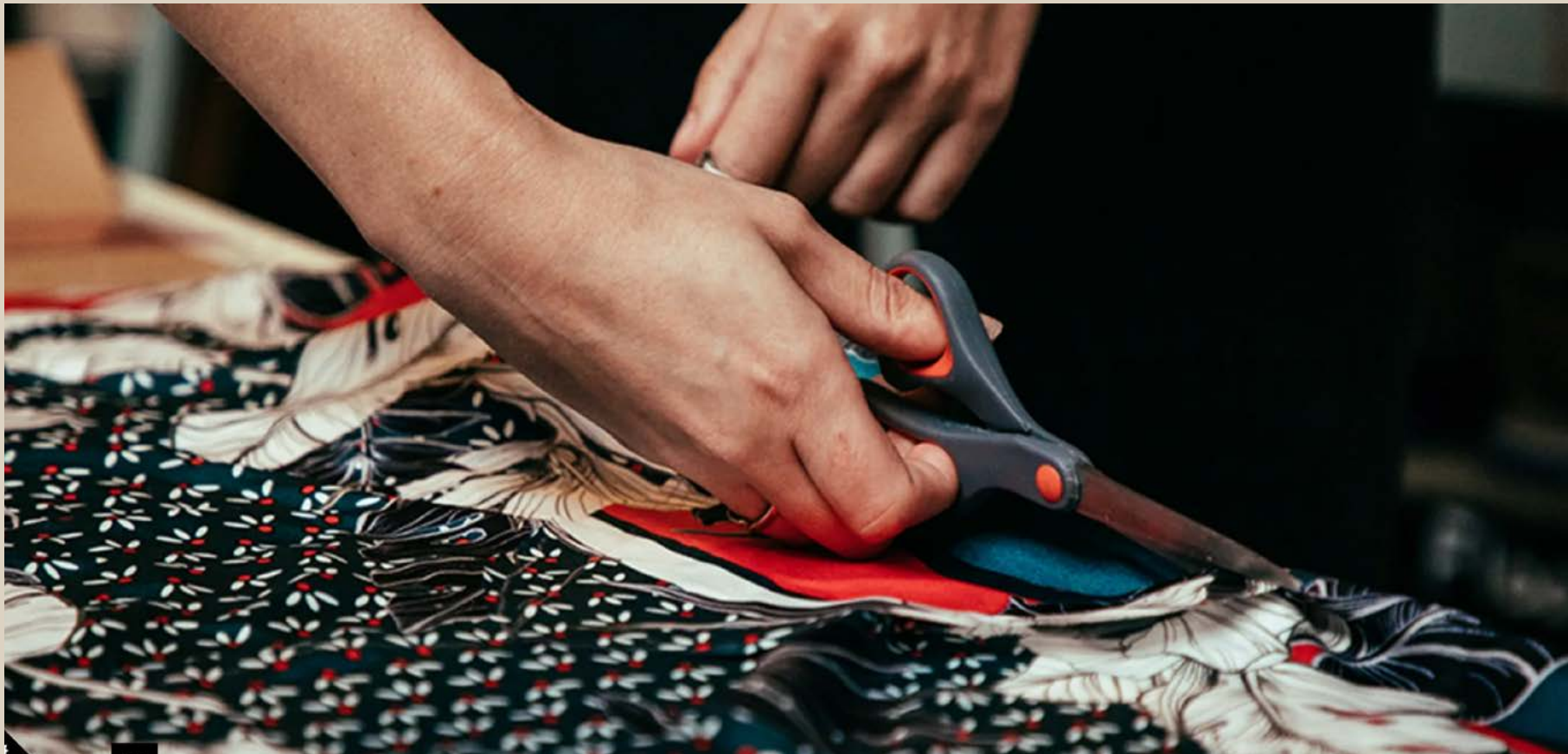
INTACH Bangalore has made significant contributions to heritage preservation in Bangalore and across Karnataka. Most recently, they developed the nomination dossier for the Hoysala Temples of Belur and Halebidu, resulting in their UNESCO World Heritage Site designation in 2023. The temples are renowned for their unique twelfth and thirteenth century art and architecture.

INTACH conducts outreach programmes to schools and communities, educating the public about heritage conservation. They mediate between government bodies and the public on heritage issues, helping save numerous buildings from demolition and influencing urban planning policies.

Centre for Sustainable Fashion (CSF) is a research, education, and knowledge exchange centre based at the London College of Fashion (LCF) at the University of the Arts London (UAL). Their work spans research, education programmes, and industry partnerships aimed at transforming fashion through a stewardship approach to people and our planet. Their programmes address governance, sustainability, social change, and the rights of nature within the fashion system.

CSF has pioneered units that develop the thinking and skills of the next generation of creatives to challenge the causes and mitigate the symptoms of global climate disaster and conflict. CSF shares our belief that fashion can, and must, be a force for good.

impact

CSF's work has achieved significant recognition and impact. Their 'Meeting Tomorrow: Students' imagination and extreme collaboration for an ever-changing world' project won the Highly Commended award from UK and Ireland Green Gown Awards 2025 under the category 'Next Generation Learning and Skills.'

Through units like 'Fashion Practices for Social Change' and 'Pockets of Love,' CSF has enabled students to respond to the needs of people displaced from their homes and their cultures, considering how fashion practices can evolve to benefit refugee communities and preserve heritage crafts.

re-wrap provides funding and resources for government shelter home stitching programmes in Bangalore, which empowers survivors of trafficking to earn a sustainable livelihood.

about

VIHAAN works at the grassroots level to fight human trafficking, and other forms of abuse and exploitation. Operating across India, they rescue victims, provide holistic support to survivors, and strengthen communities against trafficking vulnerabilities. They take a comprehensive approach, going beyond critical interventions to prevent trafficking through education and child safety programmes.

They walk alongside survivors through recovery, providing healthcare, mental health support, legal advocacy, skills training, and long-term care. They also build capacity among law enforcement and frontline professionals. Their shelter home stitching programmes help survivors build dignified livelihoods.

impact

VIHAAN has achieved significant impact in combating human trafficking and supporting survivors. They have rescued 5,137 victims of trafficking, working with law enforcement across India and internationally. They have provided after-care support to 3,564 survivors through comprehensive programmes addressing physical health, mental health, legal needs, education, and livelihoods training.

The organisation has trained 1,404 survivors and vulnerable individuals in various skills, enabling them to access economic opportunities, and trained 68,500 frontline professionals on human trafficking.



looking ahead

In 2025, we strengthened our longtime commitment to giving by partnering with organisations whose work and impact echo that of re-wrap's 3 Ps of product, people, and planet.

re-wrap enters 2026 with a deep sense of purpose rooted in our giving. As a CIC, we seek to expand our definition of community to drive a positive change for our planet and for more people than ever before. We look forward to expanding current partnerships to deliver greater impact, while also identifying new partners in our communities in the UK and in India who are catalysts of change on the ground.

The desire to create a better world for future generations fuels our journey, making a positive impact, and leaving a meaningful legacy for those who will come after us.
